Let's Talk About Consent

Getting consent from a patient is more than just having a patient sign their name to a form. Signing a form without a discussion is not consent.

There are legislative requirements for physiotherapists when obtaining consent. These requirements are included in the <u>Health Care Consent Act</u> and summarized on the College website.

Advice from the Practice Advisors when it comes to obtaining consent:

Physiotherapists must ensure that patients understand what is going to happen before the assessment or treatment begins. The PT must provide information about the nature of the treatment, its benefits, risks, side effects, the alternative courses of action, and any possible consequences of not having the treatment. The physiotherapist must also get consent from the patient to involve anyone else in their care.

Stop: Stop sending a physiotherapist assistant (PTA) to meet the patient alone if you have not obtained the patient's consent to involve someone else in their care.

Start: Making time to discuss the roles and responsibilities of the physiotherapist and the PTA with each patient or their substitute decision-maker. The patient should know the PTA by name and job title and provide consent to have them involved in their care. Physiotherapists must document consent discussions in the patient's chart.

March 31 Deadline: Complete Annual Renewal and PISA Now

Annual Renewal 2023

All physiotherapists in Independent Practice must complete annual renewal and pay the registration fee by 11:59 p.m. on March 31. The fee this year is \$635.

If you do not meet the deadline, you will need to pay an additional late fee of \$249.

You will complete annual renewal online using the PT Portal. Please check your email for more information.

PISA 2023

PISA is a mandatory self-reflection exercise that all PTs must complete each year. This includes people with both Provisional Practice and Independent Practice certificates.

PISA is mandatory, but it is not scored. You just need to complete it by the deadline. Log in to the <u>PT Portal</u> and select PISA from left-hand side to complete your exercise.
